Automatic excommunications

Bruskewitz gained national attention^[11] in 1996 for asserting that membership by Catholics in his diocese in the groups listed below, which he described as "totally incompatible with the Catholic Faith", would incur automatic excommunication.^[12]

- The Catholic group <u>Call to Action</u> and its Nebraska affiliate Call to Action Nebraska
- <u>Planned Parenthood</u> and its affiliate <u>Catholics for a Free Choice</u>, for <u>pro-choice</u> activities
- The <u>Society of St. Pius X</u> and its chapel in Lincoln (Saint Michael the Archangel Chapel)^[14]
- The <u>Freemasons</u> and their affiliate organizations, <u>Job's Daughters</u>, <u>DeMolay</u>, <u>Eastern</u> <u>Star</u>, <u>Shriners</u> and <u>Rainbow Girls</u>
- The <u>Hemlock Society</u> (now renamed <u>Compassion & Choices</u>) for its advocacy of <u>euthanasia</u>.

His pronouncement was appealed to Rome, but in 2006 the ruling was upheld by <u>Cardinal</u> <u>Giovanni Battista Re</u>, the Prefect of the <u>Congregation for Bishops</u>.^{[15][16]}

The bitter controversy ignited by Bruskewitz's threatened excommunications was one of the factors that led Cardinal <u>Joseph Bernadin</u> to initiate his unsuccessful Common Ground Project to bring the warring American Catholic factions together.^[17]
